### Dear Friends,

On Saturday October 1<sup>st</sup>, my wife Helen will kneel before Bishop Graham with three of her fellow ordinands in Norwich Cathedral. After two years of training and many more years of exploration and discernment, Helen will be ordained Deacon in the Church of England, to serve as Curate in the Broadside Benefice, our group of parishes.

I may have lost some of you already among this Church-speak. What exactly is a Deacon? Let me explain.


Helen will be ordained as a Deacon, one of three orders of the Church of England's clerical ministry (the other two are Priest and Bishop). The work of a deacon goes back over 2,000 years, to the earliest days of the Church in Jerusalem. In Acts 6, seven men were appointed by the Apostles to distribute food among the needy. The Greek word for their service to others was 'diakoneo', giving us the English word 'deacon'. The Apostles laid hands on them at the beginning of this work to show they had received the Holy Spirit and were acting under authority in the church.

Later on, deacons assisted bishops at communion and exercised authority in teaching, baptising and caring for the poor. During the middle ages, the diaconate became a stepping stone to the priesthood, and in the Church of England today, those who have become deacons are generally ordained priest a year later. As a Deacon, Helen will continue to exercise the type of ministry she has fulfilled as a Reader – preaching, teaching, visiting, leading worship, praying and working with children. In addition, she will baptise and take funerals and assist more at communion services.

As well as being deacon, Helen will also serve as Curate. This word comes from the Latin 'Curatus', meaning someone who has charge or care. When I was appointed Rector five years and the Richen entructed me with the 'cura of souls' of the

five years ago, the Bishop entrusted me with the 'cure of souls' of the people who live within our parish boundaries. This means that I am responsible to God and the Bishop for their spiritual wellbeing, whether they are church members or not. It sounds daunting, but that's the Church of England's commitment to each community. As Curate, Helen will assist in this 'cure of souls', working with our ministry and pastoral teams to show God's love in action. Please keep her in your prayers as she begins this new stage in her Christian journey. You are warmly invited to attend her ordination and her service of welcome on Sunday October 2nd at Ranworth.
